

Congratulations to Briel Hill and Amari Lockhart who are Passionary interns at the ABHMS 2023 Summer Passionary Institute. But who are Passionaries? They have been defined by the ABHMS as ordinary people doing extraordinary things that change

lives in the name of Jesus. They are passionate about responding to God's call, passionate about partnership with others in responding to God's call, and passionate about mission – to give to it and serve in it. This year is the inaugural year of this immersive cohort experience for young adults ages 18-30. They are seeking an opportunity to engage with peers and coaches to answer the questions, "What am I called to do? Who am I called to become?"

The program has nine interns and for 12 weeks, they will be on a journey with ABHMS leaders, their peers and leaders at the church or site they have chosen. For our two Passionaries, it's Mt. Calvary Baptist Church. They hope to gain practical experience that either aligns with their areas of professional interest and experience or introduce them to new areas of profession-

al interest. They will be working in various capacities at the church, for example, updating the church's website, updating the church's marquee, working with the media ministry, and assisting where needed.

Briel and Amari began the program by attending an orientation session in late May, in King of Prussia, PA. They had to commit to setting and accomplishing learning goals, participate in weekly virtual sessions with their cohorts and submit a final report/evaluation of their experience.



What is so wonderful about this program is that they will also receive monetary compensation during their participation in this summer immersion experience which ends August 7th, 2023.

Sisters Jean Floyd (Class of 1965) and Shirley Seymour (Class of 1972) were

invited back to their former Alma Mater, Grady Memorial Hospital School of Nursing, to attend a luncheon celebrating Nurses' Week held May 6th-12th. May 12th is the birthday of Florence Nightingale, and these dates are permanently fixed to celebrate Nurses' Week. The 2023 theme was "Nurses Make A Difference: Anytime, Anywhere - Always". The luncheon was held on Monday, May 8th and a total of 97 alumni were invited to attend. Grady Health Systems President/CEO John Haupert and many administrative and nursing staff welcomed us back with comments of praise for services rendered during our nursing career. Former Grady School Nursing graduates talked about the rewarding and difficult times experienced while students. A previously segregated school of nursing, the program integrated in September 1964. Previously, Black students attended Spelman College and White

students attended Georgia State College. All Grady grads know that they got a first-class education and that graduating from Grady School of Nursing prepared them to enter a nursing career where they could face and manage many challenges. We all know the familiar phrase "Where is the Grady Nurse?" and knew we were up to the challenge.

In attendance was Azira Hill, a ninety-nine-year-old former Grady School of Nursing graduate and wife of the late Jesse Hill, Civil rights activist. Ms. Hill, an immigrant from Cuba, is Co-Founder of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Talent Development. She served as co-chair of the Atlanta Symphony Associates Action Committee for Audience Development in the Black Community. She attended the ceremony with her granddaughter.

Sister Floyd stated that eleven members of her class were in attendance. Sister Seymour sat with a former class member and nursing teacher. After the luncheon, all the nurses were given a tour of the hospital and or got to visit a specific area that they worked in as a nurse.
